Sunday, October 2, marked a big new chapter in the history of the Castaner Church of the Brethren. The day began much as usual with our Church service at 9:00 a.m. and our Spanish Sunday School at 10:00 a.m. It was Dr. Burke's turn to preach, and for his subject he spoke concerning the New Testament sacraments of feet washing, the communion service, and the baptismal service.

Our Spanish Sunday School was dismissed a few minutes early so that we could hike to Dr. Burke's home for a baptismal service. This impressive service was held in the mountain river that flows past the front of Dr. Burke's home. The special significance of this service lies in the fact that our first Spanish converts were brought into the Church by the cleansing rite of baptism. The following five persons were baptized: Carmen Troche, Yolanda Cerezo, Eudelia Cordero, Esther Caraballo and Miguel Angel Velez. Dr. Burke conducted this impressive service in Spanish.

In the evening we met in the Academy building for our Fall Communion Service at which Dr. Burke officiated. The pastor gave the self-examination service in both English and Spanish. For the main explanatory remarks, for the comments, and for most of the scripture readings, both English and Spanish were used. Both Spanish and English hymns were sung.

These services have brought encouragement to all of us. We definitely feel that progress is being made. The conditions that we see all about us show clearly that there is still much work to be done. We seek your continued interest and prayers.



DEDICATION OF THE HOSPITAL AND ACADEMY

For several weeks the committee of Martha Cocanower, Father Bauza and Robert Ebey had been meeting and planning. Who should be asked to speak? What day should it be? Should we serve food? What time would be best? And many other questions were considered. Finally Columbus Day, October 12, was selected. 9:00 a.m. was the time set for the program to begin. Invitations were sent to the speakers, general invitation cards were printed, programs were

mimeographed. And so the rededication of the hospital and the dedication of the Academy were planned.

As Robert Burns once observed, however, the plans of mice and men are often modified. Came the great day, and the unit was well prepared. Even the hedge had finally been trimmed—the clippers weren't found until late Tuesday afternoon—and things in general were cleaned up. But where were all the people? A group from La Plata arrived, Father Bauza, the local Episcopalian minister, and family arrived, Sr. Barcelo, mayor of Adjuntas, Everett Meyer and family, and Father Pagan, formerly Episcopalian minister here, arrived. But where were the home folks? At 10:00, the hospital rededication service began. The sun was hot, the audience small and the speeches short. Dr. Burke welcomed everyone, Father Bauza and the local Pentecostal minister prayed the dedicatory prayers. Father Pagan told of the beginnings of the unit, and Dr. Meyer spoke of its present value to the community. Then those who wished were taken on a tour of the hospital.



And then we went to the Academy for the dedicatory service there. Prayers were given by Justus Holsinger and Dr. Stover of the La Plata Mennonite Project, and Father Bauza. Short talks were given by Sr. Juan Garrastegui, Supervisor of schools for the area, Mrs. Folch, principal of the local public school, Sr. Barcelo, mayor of Adjustan, Sr. Moreno, director of the Castaner PRRA project, and John Metzler, Jr. principal of the Academy. At 12:30 we returned to Llinas for lunch.

In the afternoon, an open meeting was held at the Centro, giving people an opportunity to ask questions and give suggestions or talks about the hospital. Much emphasis was put on the TB prevention and cure program, and a movement was started to form an anti-TB committee in the community. Crackers and demitasses of coffee closed the meeting.

As dedicatory services, the meetings were successful. As publicity or promotional services, they were not all we had hoped. As education for us, they were useful. One of the things we learned is that Columbus Day isn't holiday enough to keep people from picking coffee during the coffee season. This accounts for the small number of local people participating in the Dedication program.
